26	1. Mayor Woolstenhulme Opened the meeting.

28	2. TRUTH IN TAXATION PUBLIC HEARING
29	
30	A. PRESENTATION OF THE PROPOSED TAX INCREASE: Mayor Woolstenhulme
31	Mayor Woolstenhulme explained the truth in taxation law is designed to prevent increases in property
32	values from automatically resulting in windfall tax revenue for taxing entities. It requires public notice
33	and aims to maintain a balance between revenue and property value changes.
34	The presentation provided historical data on taxable values over the past 10-11 years, illustrating how
35	values have increased over time. He highlighted the average increase in home values, with the average
36	market value of homes in the area rising significantly. A comparison of tax rates among various taxing
37	entities in the area was shown, with a focus on those that had undergone or were undergoing the truth

in taxation process.

39 40 41	The impact of the proposed property tax change on taxpayers was also discussed. The tax rate was noted to be maintained at the same level as the previous year. The average homeowner's annual tax impact was calculated to be an additional \$64 per year or \$5 per month.
42 43 44 45	The additional revenue generated from the property tax change was earmarked for public safety and other infrastructure needs. The presentation also touched on available programs to assist eligible individuals, such as the elderly, veterans, and those with limited income, in paying their property tax bills.
46	Upon conclusion of the presentation Mayor Woolstenhulme opened the hearing for Public Comment.
47	B. PUBLIC HEARING ON THE PROPOSED PROPERTY TAX INCREASE
48 49 50 51 52	Joanne Aplanalp, resident 4337 N River Road, Oakley UT, asked for clarification on other entities certified tax rates. She also asked about the relief programs and whether they were federal, state, county or local programs. The city response was that relief programs are available from all the above. She feels strongly that people need to be made aware of the programs especially with the significant increases recently in property values.
53 54	Mayor Woolstenhulme asked if there were any further comments from the Public. Receiving none, he closed the public hearing.

58 59 60	Councilmember Frazier motioned to adopt Resolution 2023-06 Oakley City Budget and Certified Tax Rate for Fiscal Year 2023-2024. Councilmember Kimber seconded the motion. No further discussion. All voted in favor. Resolution Adopted.

62 63	Councilmember Wilmoth briefly informed Councilmembers of the Fireworks West contract for the fireworks for the 2024 Rodeo and the slight increase in pricing.
64 65 66	Mayor Woolstenhulme asked resident Rick Shapiro , a member of the outreach committee, to briefly summarize the status of the City survey. Mr. Shapiro summarized the process and informed Council that the survey would be available to the public just after Labor Day.
