Newport Academy. About three weeks ago, about seven o'clock at night, I opened up my garage door, and noticed a younger gentleman was in a Subaru driving very slowly. Frazier lane is only maybe 100 yards long. He was obviously stopping and looking and when went up to him, he was very pleasant. So, what's going on? Well, we have a client that kind of got away from us. He said he's a 15-year-old boy. He's Caucasian, stocky, build with facial hair, if you happen to see him, call the new port Academy. He continued to search for like 20 minutes right in our area, literally just kept circling. So being a little bit nervous, close the front door, close the garage. I just waited after about an hour; I called down there. You literally can't get anyone on the phone. You can't maybe during the day, it's different, but just call us if you see something. It's kind of a joke. After you push two, you push three, you wait on hold. Finally, I got somebody again, very pleasant. I know of three runways since they became Newport Academy, and these kids always run directly up the hill, so we are directly in the line of fire. The gentleman I finally got on phone was very he was very pleasant, but very condescending. And oh, we don't take kids that have any violent issues at all. I'm slow, but I'm not dumb. You got to earn your way in there. My wife was a nurse for 20 years, a special ed nurse. She's been thrown bitten by kids that, oh, they're fine. So, you're gonna have a hard time convincing me that these kids should be out in public. Obviously, they don't. But under your Oakley city application, they stayed in there. Clients may not leave the campus unsupervised at any time, they go on to say that they'd be responsible for damage claims, losses suffered by any of these kids that get loose, in my opinion, that's the wrong answer. If he ends up in somebody's garage, it's not going to end well. I mean, it's, I'm talking not only the community safety, but safety for the kids. So, I guess what I'm asking is, where do I take this? How do I get somebody's attention? When the gentleman at night, when he kind of said, Call back the next day, talk to the heck of security, which I did, again, very nice. Oh, we don't take kids like that in we, you know, they sometimes get away. Like I said, I know of three since they came, and they all end up on Frazier lane or somewhere nearby. I guess my question is, if they're not a threat, why don't you let them walk down to Ken's cash and grab a snack. They're obviously not supposed to be off campus. I got chosen to speak. We've got four neighbors in the area that nominated me to speak. If you want a petition, or if you want them to come, we're perfectly willing. I think you guys have a responsibility to let us know, or they have a responsibility to let someone know that there's a kid on the loose. When I called the following morning, the gentleman said, "We determine when we call the sheriff," again I think that's the wrong answer. You owe it to us to protect us."

Rick Shapiro, 4094 Millrace Road, Oakley UT: "I wasn't going to talk until I heard that. I'm not familiar with the runaways, but I am familiar with the kinds of kids you know that go to places like Newport, because both of my sons spent time, you know, in places like that. I think casting, you know, categorizing them is anything but kids that you know are having mental health issues, some of them might be having addiction issues. You know, there may be. I'm not surprised that occasionally, you know, a kid gets away. You know, that's par for the course. It doesn't sound like there have been any violent consequences from any of those kids, you know, trying to run away. But I took objection, and just wanted to for the record, you know, these are not bad kids. They're kids with issues. They're not that different from the kids. A lot of the kids probably in the

schools here in South Summit. And so, I think as you look at this issue, you ought to look at it in that light and deal with it in a humane manner, and not categorize these kids as troublemakers or violent individuals. Thanks."

3. CONSENT CALENDAR:

Recorder Rydalch directed Council to the financial report in their materials and summarized budget items year to date and reviewed items for the upcoming city newsletter. No questions from Council.

Councilmember Smart motioned to approve the consent calendar. **Councilmember Frazier** seconded the motion. All voted in favor. **Consent Calendar approved.**

4. ARI IONNIDES, COUNTY COUNCIL CANDIDATE:

Mr. Ionnides introduced himself to the Councilmembers and gave his professional background in utilizing data analytics to streamline projects and organizations. He discussed his experience working on the North Summit Fire District during a period of difficulty and how he enjoyed that experience in working together for a solution regarding EMS coverage in the County. He spoke of his desire to continue to serve the members of the County by being elected to the County Council.

5. PUBLIC HEARING: RUBY LANE SUBDIVISION – Applicants Nicholas and Debra Tarrant:

Planner S. Woolstenhulme presented the plat for the Ruby Lane Subdivision, a parcel of 20 acres with A-5 zoning. Density entitlement is four development rights. The proposal is for a five-lot subdivision which includes a unit of bonus density in exchange for a proposed City water utility easement that would provide access to property just north of the subdivision for a possible future city culinary water tank. Owners are also surrendering 3 shares of water to the City.

Councilmembers asked questions regarding the specific location of subdivision, width of the road, placement of future water line and possible storage tank. **Planning Commissioner Doug Evans** addressed the Council with context for why this area is being looked at as a possible location for additional water storage. The location in the North/west area of the City would improve fire flow and fire storage for the entire City.

Further clarification was provided to Council that there is one unit of bonus density being awarded in exchange for the waterline easement for a total density of 5 units.

Mayor Woolstenhulme opened the Public Hearing for the Ruby Lane Subdivision.

Rob Lynch: 250 N North Bench Rd, Oakley: "My name is Rob Lynch. I'm the owner next door. Can I ask you a question, sure, what's the council's objective on protecting Oakley, our community, and the density like Do you realize this is going to be the most dense subdivision in all of Oakley, from my perspective?"

Mayor Woolstenhulme: "We have a master plan that's all in keeping with what you see up on the board. So, we do believe in allowing people to take advantage of the rights they have."

Rob Lynch: "I agree with that as well. So, but I heard a couple things. So, you have an interest in easements, and so the easement Stephanie is on the east. Okay? You know I'm next door, right? I'm happy to talk to you about easements. I'm happy to donate easements. I'm happy to donate my shares. What was the shares of water they're going to give to you for this extra property? Three and a half shares are three. Okay? I've got 120 something. I think I use 20% of it. Okay? So I'm happy to help you if you want that. Okay, all right, I own the old Lindsay property right next door, 75 acres. Okay, I've been improving on it since I've been here. And you know, this is right on top of me. Okay, I bought this place. I put millions of dollars into this. We own horses. We own animals like we believe in, you know, keeping locally what I came here for this, right? And this, to me, is not good. Just FYI, okay? And I'm against it, 1,000% I will, I will give you those shares that they're offering you free right now on record three and a half. What is it? It's yours. Slow this down, cut this back. That's what I would ask you to do."

Nicholas Tarrant: Applicant: "I disagree with what Rob says as far as the most dense correct me, if I'm wrong, the most dense subdivision on the on just on the east side of Rob is a row of one acre to two acre Lots homes already built just on his other property line. You have an Estate's Lane which is just below us of North bench. Those are one acre lots. There's five of them, I do believe. So that's, that's a false statement as far as density goes, and then as I don't understand what his objection would be. He's got a nice fence there. He's got his horses there, and I don't see that it would cause any problem with his property whatsoever, so I don't understand his objection to this."

Having received no further public comment Mayor Woolstenhulme closed the public hearing.

Mayor Woolstenhulme recommended that the Council consider tabling the item and consider the proposals presented by vested neighboring parties.

Councilmember Frazier clarified for the public in attendance that the applicants are entitled to four lots under current zoning and that the City is considering one additional unit as a bonus for the granting of the water line easement.

Councilmember Smart stated that he questions as to why the offer by the neighboring party was not brought up in the previous public hearing in front of the planning commission. The applicant has invested considerable time and resources.

Councilmember Frazier motioned to approve the Ruby Lane Subdivision final plat. Councilmember
 Smart seconded the motion. Vote was 3-1. Councilmember Neff voted against the motion. Motion
 carries. Final plat for the Ruby Lane Subdivision approved.

6. CAMPGROUND PROPOSAL:

David Diehl referred the Council to his updated proposal.

Recorder Rydalch stated that City legal counsel believes that further terms need to be added, and Council should get more clarification on the proposed terms presented by Mr. Diehl.

7. CONSERVATION SANCTUARY PROPOSAL: Summit Land Conservancy & Shayna Starks, Starks

.c

Cheryl Fox presented a proposal to the City to utilize property already owned by the city and create public access, natural sanctuary, where people can be buried. The proposal would create an income stream for the City as well as preserve open space in a beautiful area. She referenced the history of working with Oakley City for places like Steven's Grove, and Riverbend Park. The team then presented a video and information regarding conservation or sanctuary burials. She displayed maps of the area to be considered for the burial grounds. **Ms. Starks** addressed the logistics of natural burial, i.e., preservation prior to burial, burial materials, depth of burial sites,

Ms. Fox proposed an arrangement with the City where the City holds the property, grants a conservation easement to Summit Land Conservancy, and the conservancy would contract with Starks Mortuary and manage the conservation burial area. A revenue sharing proposal was presented where the City would share in the burial site revenues.

Council discussion revolved around the number of burial sites, a pricing model, and cremation and pet burials. The Council agreed to consider the proposal and would like to discuss it further at their next regular meeting.

8. MISCELLANEOUS WATER ITEMS: INFORMATIVE – NO ACTION:

a. Lead Copper Rule: Recorder Rydalch presented to Council a summary of the Federal regulations regarding the Lead Copper rule and the City's requirements to have an inventory to the State by October of this year. She summarized the City's plan to collect the required information for the inventory.

209 b. Cross Connection/Backflow Prevention: Recorder Rydalch summarized the City's 210 requirement to perform backflow inspections and cross connection monitoring. A plan 211 for execution was presented. c. Outdoor Watering Restrictions: After conferring with City Water Operator, the Mayor, 212 213 and staff the outdoor watering restrictions are as follows: three days of watering until June 15th after which it is the two-day watering system that has been in place for the 214 215 last several years. Restrictions are needed as the new well is not yet piped into the 216 distribution system. 217 9. MAYORS REPORT: 218 219 a. CSL, the firm handling the feasibility study regarding possible arena expansion, will be in 220 town next week holding meetings with stakeholders. 221 b. Easement for the Cattail Well has been executed with Jan Manning. 222 223 **10. COUNCILMEMBER REPORTS:** 224 a. Councilmember Smart: reported on the river alteration project at Riverbend Park. 225 Bridge installation is underway. He encouraged Councilmembers to visit the area. 226 b. Councilmember Frazier: reported a complaint received regarding persons residing in 227 campers, trailers, and in sheds not suited for permanent habitation.
